Your Research Paper in 8 Weeks

Week 1 Understand your assignment and choose a topic. Read your assignment carefully! What is your instructor already providing? Topic, outline, type and number of sources, length of paper, deliverables before the final paper, due date? o Clarify what type of research paper you'll be writing. Two common approaches to a research paper are argumentative (defend one side of a controversial topic), analytical (explain and evaluate a topic), etc. Understand the grading rubric. o Pick your topic – not too narrow, not too broad. Your topic will develop into a thesis statement as you begin researching. Begin researching. Week 2 Collect and begin reading journal and magazine articles, encyclopedia articles, reports, and information from *credible* websites. o Do not stop researching until you have at least 8 sources. More is better! Some sources may end up being irrelevant to your topic once you've read through them. o Take notes on what you read. If you write from your notes, you'll be less likely to inadvertently plagiarize. More on plagiarism: https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/589/02/ Week 3 Draft your thesis statement and outline. Continue researching if necessary. The thesis and outline are essential to staying on topic when you begin writing. More on thesis statements: https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/545/01/ More on outlines: https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/544/01/ • As you draft these, it will become apparent if you need to collect more research. Week 4 Create your reference page. Review how to create in-text citations. o Start by properly setting up your paper using APA formatting. Use place holders to create a title page, running header, abstract page and first page of the paper. Add your reference page at the end.

	 Type out your reference page. This will help you construct your in-text citations as you write and avoid plagiarism.
Week 5	Write your first draft.
	 Make sure to write from your outline! Focus on topic sentences. Paragraphs should be at least 5 sentences long to allow for explanation, details and examples that support your topic sentence. More on topic sentences: https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/606/01/
Week 6	Complete your first draft.
	 Write your introduction and conclusion. These are best done last since your paper will determine how best to introduce and conclude this topic for your reader. Give your paper a title and write the abstract. Remember, the abstract gives the reader an overview of your paper and includes your thesis statement and main ideas.
Week 7	Revise your paper.
	 Does your paper do what the thesis statement says it will do? Does your paper transition sensibly from one paragraph to the next? Does each paragraph address one idea? Do you have a clear introduction and conclusion?
Week 8	Complete your final draft.
	 Ask a fellow student, friend or family member to read your paper for grammar and punctuation errors. Ask them to focus only on these issues. Turn in your paper!
